El Coquí is a Puerto Rican children's song composed by María Luisa Muñoz and published in the book Canta Conmigo in 1946. María Luisa Muñoz a renowned music educator in Puerto Rico. This song has become one of the traditional ones amongst children in the Island. It tells the how much we appreciate the Coquí.

The Puerto Rican coquí is a very small - tiny - tree frog about one inch long. Some coqués look green, some brown and some yellowish - actually they are translucent. Coqués have a high-pitched sound and can be heard from far away.

The coqués begin to sing when the sun goes down at dusk. Their melody serenades islanders to sleep. Coqués sing all night long until dawn when they stop singing and head for the nest. Puerto Ricans love their coqués and have written poems, stories, and Aguinaldos about them including this song that says:
