How to
FLASH MOB

FLASH MOBS ARE BECOMING A WONDERFUL WAY OF BRINGING A BRIEF PERFORMANCE TO AN AUDIENCE WHERE THEY ARE! HANDBELLS CERTAINLY ARE NO EXCEPTION.

The concepts of most flash mobs are to gather quickly in a public place, perform a “random act of music” for a brief time, then quickly wander away. The fun lies in the unpredicted time and place of the performance and the fact that it is over quickly.

HOW TO INTERPRET THIS PRINTED SCORE

The score should be rung from the lowest bass staff up. The music is in simple layers and must be memorized. This isn't complex at all. Play all the measures before adding the next layer. Typically, in performing these scores, you should start only with the lowest bass and involve one or two people. The “layers” add from the bottom, until the entire group is gathered.

Play and repeat the few measures 3-4 times before the highest trebles wander off to begin the departure of all. It ends with the bass playing the last notes and walking away. The objective (seriously!) is not to receive applause as a traditional performance might, but just to present a brief bit of “Christmas Cheer” and go!

Most of the scores *do* have final chords. That is in case you are “caught” without an easy exit!

I do suggest that you have a practice run in several locations indoors to work out the smooth entrances and exits of parts. I also suggest that you avoid standing in a perfect line, rather, gather in a group or groups.

SETTING THE STAGE

Since these songs will be played at Christmas time, you will probably wear coats and winter type clothing. This is a help as you can easily hide the bells as you approach your spots to flash mob.

You should casually wander in to the performance location in small groups to “watch.” Then just “happen” to have bells in your pockets or shopping bags and become a part of the performance.

Have in mind a few locations or a route and be open to the leadership of the bass people. They might see a perfect spot to stop and play!

EXPECTATIONS

You might not see a crowd gather. We noticed often that people would walk twenty steps and then watch from a distance.




