## Meditations on the Theme of Peace



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As I write these words, the world is recovering from another act of terrorism. Unfortunately, these acts have become all-too-numerous, inundating television news reports, regardless of the time of day. These have left many people wondering, "Is there any place safe anymore? When will enough finally be enough?"

Meditations on the Theme of Peace comes out of an idea I had in my early 20s when I became fascinated with the idea of musical cryptograms – ways to spell out ordinary words using only the letters of the musical alphabet.

As I began developing the idea, I soon discovered the word "Peace" musically spells itself out almost naturally. Using the French system (where H=A, I=B, J=C, and so on), the letter "P" was assigned the musical letter B. For roughly 15 years, I only had a five note theme.

Fast forward to age 40, when the world itself was becoming increasingly violent and perilous. After hearing about a recent attack in Nice, France on Bastille Day, I heard this five note theme once again. At that point, I felt God pressing on my heart to write these notes down and knew I could no longer let these five notes sit. Yet I had no idea how I should structure this simple five note theme into a greater whole. Then I heard it: the Latin phrase "Dona nobis pacem" ("Grant us peace"). The final puzzle began placing itself together.

While the original five note motif is a central musical theme in the composition, I also wanted the Latin word "pacem" ("peace") to be featured by itself in isolation. The E-flat pedal tone represents those voices who are crying out for peace. At the end of the composition, the "pacem" theme joins the "peace" theme as a way of suggesting that those voices are indeed heard.

With the exception of a few places, this composition uses the concept of perfect harmony in the accompaniment, where no extra harmonic tones are permitted to be heard (for example, all A-flat major chords have only those three notes present which make up the triad).

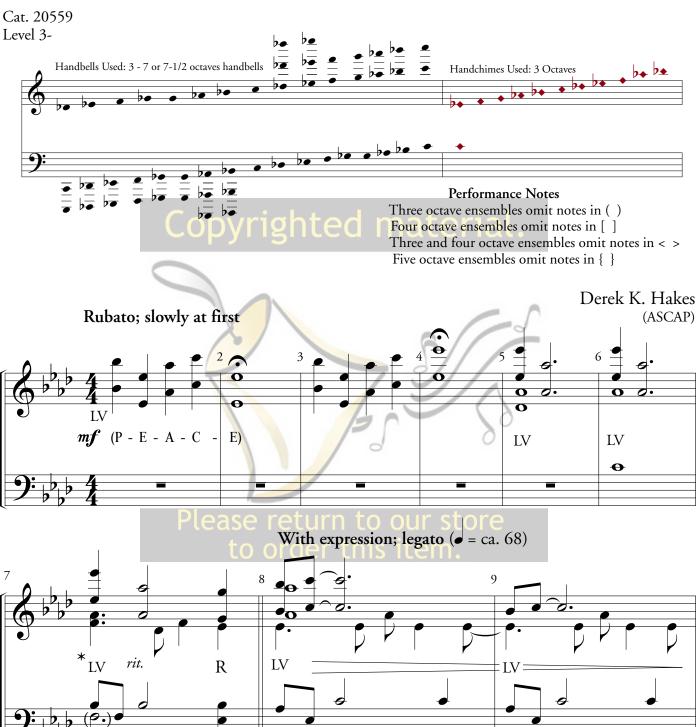
