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## Composer's Notes

*Spin the Dreydl* is a setting of two familiar Hanukkah songs, *I Have a Little Dreydl* and *S'vivon*. Both songs talk about a dreydl (also spelled dreidel), which is a small top with four sides that is spun in a traditional children's game of chance. Each side of the dreydl contains one of the four Hebrew initials of the phrase, "(A) Great Miracle Happened There."

The song which opens and closes this arrangement is *I Have a Little Dreydl*. The words help to describe how the game is played:

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*I have a little dreydl. I made it out of clay;  
And when it's dry and ready, then dreydl I shall play.  
O, dreydl, dreydl, dreydl, I made it out of clay;  
O dreydl, dreydl, dreydl, now dreydl I shall play.*

*It has a lovely body, with legs so short and thin;  
And when it is all tired, it drops and then I win.  
O dreydl, dreydl, dreydl, with legs so short and thin;  
O dreydl, dreydl, dreydl, it drops and then I win!*

*My dreydl's always playful, it loves to dance and spin.  
A happy game of dreydl, come play, now let's begin.  
O, dreydl, dreydl, dreydl, it loves to dance and spin.  
O dreydl, dreydl, dreydl, come play, now let's begin!*

The second song, *S'vivon*, also talks about the spinning of the dreydl. The word *s'vivon* is Hebrew for the Yiddish word *dreydl*.
